A Maritime Tradition Continues on the Great Lakes

In 1886, a group of Buffalo ship masters united to form an organization for the mutual benefit of professional mariners and their families.

Originally called Excelsior Marine Benevolent Association, the organization was to provide financial support to disabled members or their beneficiaries in case of death, to provide educational opportunities for the improvement of navigational skill, and to insure that the Great Lakes ship masters had a voice in the formation of safety, navigation rules, and regulations.

The organization was not conceived as a labor union, but as a voluntary association of individuals committed to the betterment of their profession.

The association was soon embraced by most Great Lakes ship masters and changed its name to the Ship Masters' Association in 1893.

A growing Canadian presence was reflected in the change of the name to the International Ship Masters' Association in 1917.

From then on, and continuing today, mariners from both countries work with government agencies and the marine industry toward the creation of a safer and more efficient maritime commerce.

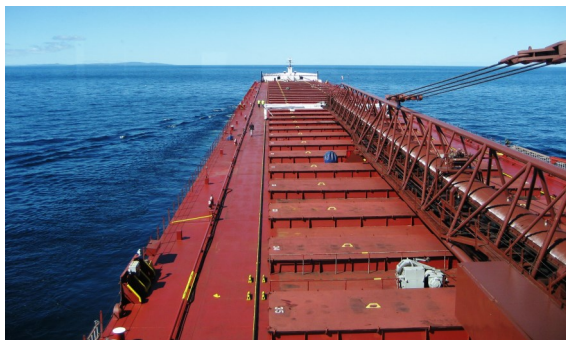
ISMA - A LEGACY OF TRADITION IN MARITIME

Our Philosophy






"The purpose of the Association shall be to unite all ship masters and licensed merchant officers of good moral character; to elevate the character of its members; and to utilize their professional experience to promote safety on the Great Lakes and any navigable waters." (ISMA Constitution)

The ISMA functions as the representative of all Great Lakes mariners in many important ways. Through meetings, committees, newsletters, and communication between members, ISMA informs and educates its members on issues of vital concern to mariners.

And through the respected ISMA name, mariners of all levels have a collective voice when critical decisions on maritime affairs are made by government. The Association plays a cooperative role with the Canadian and US Coast Guard and various other maritime organizations and associations.

ISMA Newsletter

Providing the backbone of communication throughout the year, ISMA publishes a quarterly newsletter to maintain a consistent avenue of information to all members including those who are on board ship for extended periods.

The association's quarterly newsletter, contains information on maritime operation, navigation, and safety items; details of maritime events of interest; ISMA Convention information; news from the local lodges; member news; and history.

ISMA Committees

The ISMA appoints numerous committees to investigate issues facing mariners, and issue reports for consideration by the membership. Commissioned on both the Local Lodge and the Grand Lodge levels, committees include, navigation, engineering, legislation, membership, events, and jurisprudence.

Annual Grand Lodge Convention

The ISMA sponsors an annual Grand Lodge Convention for all members to gather for events ranging from educational sessions and guest speakers to discussion of issues and ISMA business. Hosted by a different local lodge each winter, activities also include business luncheons, theme dinners, and excursions around the convention city. Each convention is capped by the impressive Grand Lodge Officer Induction Ceremony followed by the formal Ship Masters' Grand Ball.

The Grand Lodge

The ISMA Grand Lodge is made up of elected officers, elected delegates, and appointed officers from the local lodges. It is the body through which ISMA forms its official positions regarding legislation and conducts the majority of its official business.

At least once each year, the Grand Lodge convenes to consider proposals offered by the local lodges, elect new Grand Lodge Officers, and set a course for the organization for the coming year. All ISMA members are invited to attend each session of the Grand Lodge at the annual ISMA Convention.
